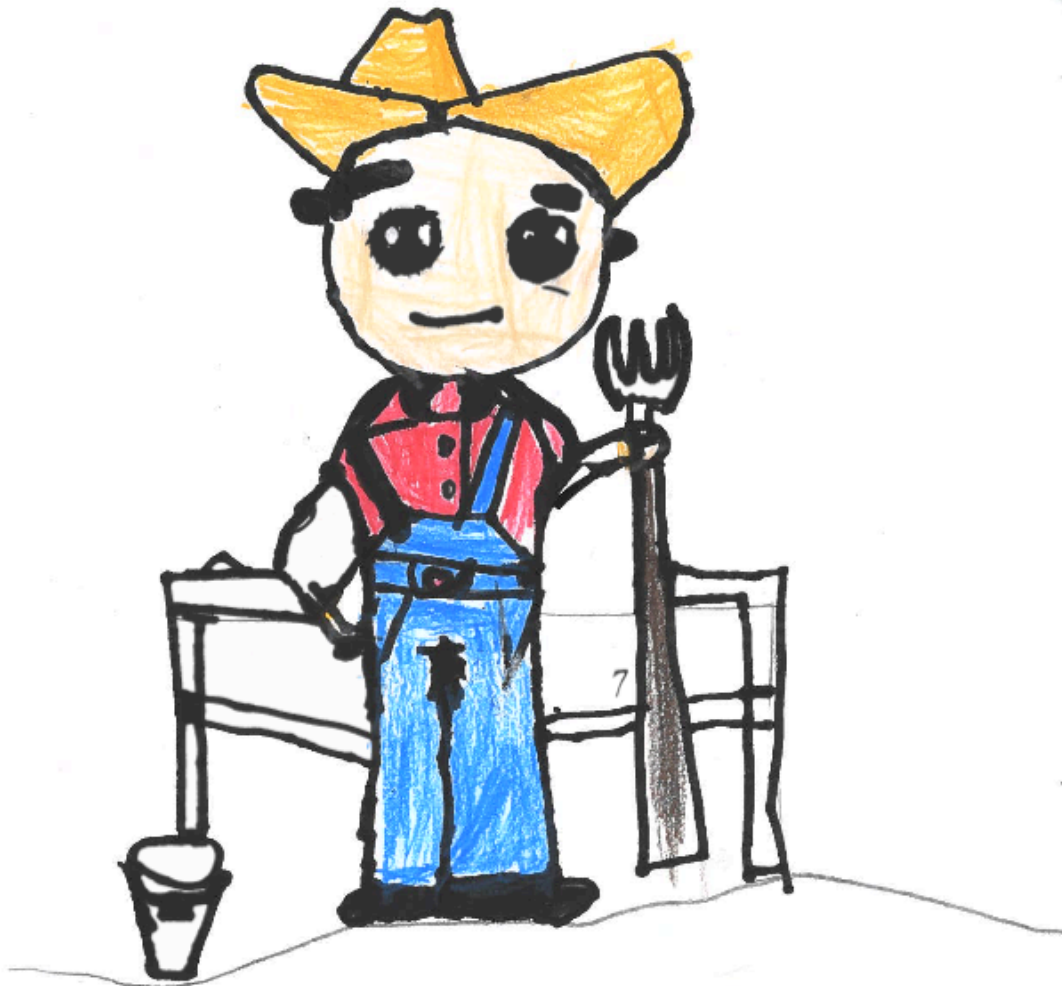

HOW TO ENTER

Entries for Winnifred Mooney Hall and Junior Classes will be accepted at the Clipperton Hall on:

THURSDAY, AUGUST 24, 2023

1:00 pm – 8:00 pm

Entries for the Cattle Show and Small Livestock will be accepted at the Emiry Building on:

THURSDAY, AUGUST 24 4:00 – 7:00 pm

AND FRIDAY, AUGUST 25 8:00 – noon

All entries must be accompanied by a completed entry tag. Please be sure to fill out your entry tag so we can read it. Entry tags must be signed and secured to the item being entered.

Entries must also be accompanied by a Massey Fair entry form. Entry forms may be handwritten on a Massey Fair duplicating form or an online form using AssistExpo. If completing online, please bring two copies of your online entry form when you enter your items.

Entry tags and forms will be available at the Fair Office, Webbwood Library, Massey Public Library, and Walford Post Office.

To help our volunteers and to expediate the entry process, please complete your entry tags and entry forms prior to arriving to enter your items.

RULES OF THE FAIR

The Massey Fair is held at the Massey Fair Grounds at 599 Imperial Street North, Massey, Ontario on the last weekend in August.

1. The privilege of membership is open to all residents of Ontario.
2. Massey Agricultural Society membership fees for 2023 are \$2 for junior members (18 and under as of January 1, 2023) and \$10 for adults. An adult membership is required to enter adult classes. A junior membership is required to enter junior classes with the exception of School Work Classes (page 34). Memberships may be purchased at the time of entry or in advance.
3. Prizes will be paid by cheque and will be mailed within three weeks of the last day of the fair. PLEASE CASH YOUR CHEQUE WITHIN A MONTH OF RECEIPT. If, in any year, more prizes are being awarded than there is money in the treasury to pay, the Society will pay the largest percentage possible.
4. No prize shall be awarded if the article or animal is not considered worthy of a prize by the judge.
5. All prizes are to be accepted as donated or awarded and may not be exchanged.
6. Every article, product, or item entered must be the bonafide property of, be owned by, or made by, the person entering it.
7. An exhibitor may enter only one item per section of each class with the exception of livestock.
8. All protests must be made to the Secretary, in writing, before the exhibit leaves the fair grounds. The written protest must be accompanied by a sum of \$10.00, which will become the property of the Society if the protest is not substantiated.
9. It is the responsibility of the Director, and not the Judge, to determine what exhibits meet the requirements specified. The Judge's only duty is to place exhibits and report irregularities to the Director in Charge. Any person who shall attempt to interfere with the Judges while in the discharge of their duties, or who shall afterwards, on the premises of the society, use any contemptuous or abusive language to any Judge may be banned from the Massey Fairgrounds for one year thereafter. Judges and Directors are requested to report any breach of this rule.
10. Noncompliance with the rules and regulations of the Society on the part of the exhibitor shall incur the forfeit of any premiums awarded.
11. The prize list is subject to correction of typographical errors and/or omissions. In the case of a disagreement, the ruling of the Show Director shall be final.
12. The Society will take every precaution under the circumstances to ensure the safety of articles and animals sent to the exhibition, yet they wish it to be distinctly understood that the owners themselves must take the risk of exhibiting the item, and, should any article be lost or stolen, the Directors will give all the assistance in their power toward recovering same, but will not make any payment for the value thereof.
13. Judging standards for all classes and sections will be as per the Horticultural Judging Standards. The only difference between agricultural and horticultural judging standards is in the Sweet Corn, and for the Massey Fair, all husks should be removed.

AGRICULTURAL DEPARTMENT

CLASS 18 – GRAIN

Sections 1, 2, 3, and 4 must be displayed in a one litre glass jar.

SECTION:

1. Barley – not less than 1 litre
2. Oats – not less than 1 litre
3. Trefoil Seed – not less than 1 litre
4. Field Peas – not less than 1 litre
5. Sheaf of Barley – 3” at the band
6. Sheaf of Oats – 3” at the band
7. Field corn – 6 ears
8. Ensilage Corn Stalks – 12 mature
9. Sunflower – 2 stalks
10. Sunflower – largest head - 1

CLASS 19 – HAY AND FORAGE

Sections 1 and 2 must be displayed in a one litre glass jar. Sections 4-8 should be displayed in a clear plastic bag.

SECTION:

1. Timothy Seed – not less than 1 litre
2. Clover Seed – not less than 1 litre
3. Hay – 85% or more grasses
4. Legumes Hay – 85% or more legumes
5. Mixed Hay
6. Second Cut Hay
7. Ensilage – corn
8. Ensilage – Hay

HOW TO PREPARE FLOWERS FOR EXHIBITION

- a. Flowers are to be shown with own foliage and no artificial colouring, unless specified.
- b. Tags must be securely attached to containers with rubber bands, string, tape, etc., or they will not be judged.
- c. A bloom is an individual flower, one on a stem.
- d. A bud showing colouring is counted as a bloom.
- e. A stem or stalk may have more than one flower or bud, e.g. Sweet Pea, Lavatera.
- f. A spike is an upright stem with several flowers, e.g. Gladiola or Snapdragon.
- g. A spray is a portion of a plant with a number of flowers on one stem. e.g. Mum.
- h. Pot size no larger than 12" for potted plants.
- i. It is best to pick cut flowers early in the morning.
- j. Cut stems at a 45 degree angle to maximize water uptake.
- k. Leaves should be removed from the lower part of the stem so that no leaves end up in the vase/container.

CLASS 22 – ARRANGEMENTS

Arrangements should not exceed 30"

SECTION:

1. "People put Flowers in the Craziest Things", real flowers only
2. "Once around your Own Back Yard" – bouquet in a vase, real flowers only
3. "Local fields and trails" – real flowers only, weeds, wayside flowers welcome
4. "Fun with Foliage" – using only foliage
5. "Tiny Tim" – a miniature design no more than 5" in any direction
6. "Solitaire" – design using one bloom
7. "Keep Calm and Purple on" for Massey-Walford Horticultural Society's 60th Anniversary
8. Fruit or Vegetables with Flowers
9. Any other arrangement not listed

CLASS 23 – HOUSE PLANTS

Plants must be growing in containers.

SECTION:

1. House Begonia in Bloom
2. African Violet in Bloom
3. Geranium in Bloom
4. Patio container with mixed plants
5. Flowering hanging planter
6. Single succulent or cactus in a novel container
7. Collection of Cacti and/or Succulent in manageable container
8. Fairy Garden - plants accessories
9. Plants in a wicker basket
10. Pot of two or more growing herbs
11. Foliage plant in a container
12. Any other house plant not listed

HOW TO PREPARE VEGETABLES FOR EXHIBITION

- a. Unless specified, entries must be on a plain white plate and uncovered.
- b. Vegetables and roots are to be cleaned or polished, but not washed, before showing and must be worthy of a prize.
- c. Choose medium sized carrots, potatoes, and beets.
- d. Choose regular shaped and uniform sized specimens.
- e. Roots and cucumbers are to be shown with a $\frac{3}{4}$ " stem.
- f. Tomatoes are to be shown with a stem.
- g. Onions should be ready for winter storage, not peeled. Choose large onions.
- h. Pumpkins and squash must have stems on.
- i. Corn should be husked with 1" stem left on.

CLASS 24 – VEGETABLES

1. Beets – round – 4, washed, but not scrubbed
2. Beets – cylindrical – 4 washed, but not scrubbed
3. Broccoli – 1 bunch
4. Brussel Sprouts – 10
5. Bush Beans, Green – 6 pods, stems attached
6. Bush Beans, Yellow – 6 pods, stems attached
7. Cabbage – trimmed to 2 layers of outer leaves – $\frac{1}{2}$ " stock

14. Cucumbers – Green – 2, $\frac{1}{2}$ " stem on

18. Garlic – 2 bulbs
19. Kale, one plant, any variety
20. Leeks – 5
21. Lettuce – any variety – 2 heads
22. Muskmelon, 2, stems attached
23. Onions – multiplier -1 bunch
24. Onions – red - 5
25. Onions – Spanish - 5
26. Onions – yellow – 5
27. Parsley (with roots) – 2 bunches

FOOD DEPARTMENT

HOW TO PREPARE JAMS, JELLIES, PICKLES, and RELISHES FOR EXHIBITION

- a. Jars must be sealed with new lids. Freezer jam does not need to be sealed. NO WAX
- b. Canned or preserved exhibits must be shown in jars no smaller than 250 mL.
- c. Jars must be clean and without labels.
- d. Tags must be securely fastened to exhibits using string, tape, or elastic.

OAAS MAPLE SYRUP COMPETITION

1. The Massey Fair winning entrant of Class 27 – Section 2 is eligible to enter the District 12 Competition in November 2023.
2. For the District and Provincial competitions exhibits shall consist of two (2) curved Kent style glass bottles or equivalent, of Maple Syrup, Canada Grade A – Amber, each having a capacity of 250 ml.

PROVINCIAL COMPETITION

1. The entrant must have won the District 12 Competition to be eligible to enter the Ontario Competition in February of 2024.
2. Entries must be labelled on the **BOTTOM** of the containers only with a supplied entry number or identifier. No other labels will be permitted.
3. All maple syrup should have a flavour characteristic of its respective colour class and be free from any objectionable odour or taste. It is best to sample from the same lot before submitting your entries to the OAAS.
4. Any maple syrup entry containing any form of foreign material will be disqualified from the competition. An approved maple syrup colorimeter will be used to assess the colour.
5. Maple syrup will be judged using the standards published in the OAAS in Agriculture and Horticulture Judging Standards for Ontario Fairs.
6. Prizes for the Provincial Competition will be as follows: **1st \$50.00, 2nd \$30.00, 3rd \$20.00.**
7. It is a condition of entry that all maple syrup products entered become property of the OAAS. First and second place entries will not be returned to the exhibitor but will be placed for Auction at the convention.
8. Syrup will be judged using the following standard.

Flavour: 40 points

Colour: 20 points

Density: 30 points

Clarity: 10 points

OAAS HONEY COMPETITION

1. The Massey Fair winning entrant of Class 27 – Section 4 is eligible to enter the District 12 Competition in November 2023.
2. For the District and Provincial competitions exhibits shall consist of two (2) clear glass containers, each having a capacity of 500 grams (375 mL).

PROVINCIAL COMPETITION

1. The entrant must have won the District 12 Competition to be eligible to enter the Ontario Competition in February of 2024.
2. Entries must be labelled on the BOTTOM of the containers only with a supplied entry number or identifier. No other labels will be permitted.
3. Any honey entry containing any form of foreign material will be disqualified from the competition. An approved colorimeter will be used to assess the colour.
4. Honey will be judged using the standards published in the OAAS in Agriculture and Horticulture Judging Standards for Ontario Fairs.
5. Prizes for the Provincial Competition will be as follows: **1st \$50.00, 2nd \$30.00, 3rd \$20.00.**
6. It is a condition of entry that all maple syrup products entered become property of the OAAS. First and second place entries will not be returned to the exhibitor but will be placed for Auction at the convention.
7. Honey will be judged using the following standard.

APPEARANCE 45 points

- 15 Density (moisture content)
- 10 Brightness
- 10 Flavour and aroma
- 5 Colour

CLARITY 45 points

- 15 Free from crystals
- 15 Free from pollen, wax, etc
- 15 Free from air bubbles either in suspension or as froth

CONTAINERS 10 points

- 5 Pleasant appearance, of equal size and shape
- 5 Uniform level of fill

HOW TO PREPARE BAKED GOODS FOR EXHIBITION

- a. All entries must be homemade. No store-bought mixes.
- b. All foods must be in clear sealable bags.
- c. All foods, except loaves, cakes, and pies should be shown on white plates.
- d. Muffins should not have paper liners. Cupcakes may be shown with or without liners.
- e. A recipe or ingredient list must be attached.
- f. Bread Machines may only be used in Sections 6 and 7.
- g. No baking may contain cannabis or cannabutter.

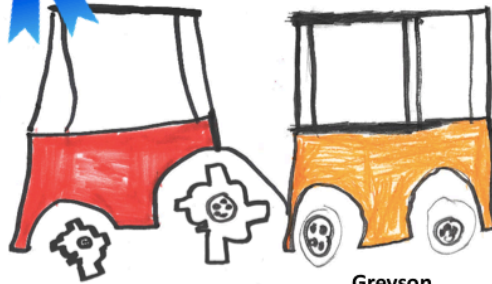

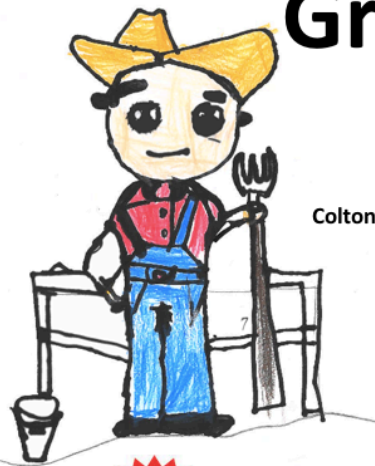

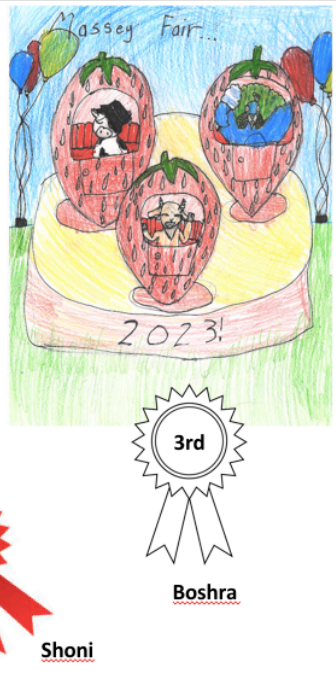

1. All competitors must be valid members of the Massey Agricultural Society. Memberships must be purchased in advance of competitions. See page
2. All competitors must be registered in advance of each competition and registration fees must be paid in advance. No registrations will be accepted the day of competitions. An ADULT must register those under 18 years of age.
3. All waivers must be signed before the rider is mounted. Waivers are required for all competitors, regardless of age.
4. Age Categories are Lead Line 11 years and under, Tenderfoot run in OVER specified time, Youth 11-17 years, Adult 18 and over.
5. Any competitor under the age of 19 is prohibited from showing a stallion in any class.
6. All riders under the age of 18 must wear a properly fitting ASTM approved helmet with harness and secure footwear with heel at all times when mounted in the ring as well as on the grounds. Any infraction could mean disqualification. This dress code will be strictly enforced. We strongly recommended that an approved helmet is worn by everyone.
7. It is a rider's responsibility to be prepared for all classes. Horses must be ready and available in the holding area or the competitor may be disqualified. Riders of horses who are difficult to get into the ring may take a pass and let the next competitor enter. They may take a maximum of three passes before being disqualified.
8. Riders will not enter the ring and begin their run until called by the announcer. Violation will be subject to disqualification of that run.
9. The Massey Agricultural Society reserves the right to postpone the show, limit entries, divide or combine classes, alter or govern all conditions and order of classes.
10. Events may be cancelled or combined at the discretion of the show committee if there are fewer than five entries per class.
11. There will be a refund in registration fees ONLY if the event in question has been cancelled.
12. Neither sponsors, nor the organizing committee, nor the Massey Agricultural Society will be held responsible for any damage, injury or loss to persons, property or horses of the exhibitors or the spectators.
13. All horses must have appropriate Western bit and tack.
14. Objections must be made in writing and delivered to the Massey Fair Office within 24 hours of the event in question. A Fee of \$50.00 is required with the written objection, and will be forfeited to the Massey Fair if the objection is not sustained.
15. Exhibition entries are allowed. Riders in exhibition entries may not enter the same horse in another class.
16. A contestant will be given a "no time/ penalty" for any of the following reasons:
 - a. Off pattern
 - b. Knocking over a barrel or pole completely, regardless if it stands back up in either end, touching the barrel permitted, without penalty. If the barrel or pole is knocked, 10 seconds will be added to your final time.

- c. If a rider falls off before crossing the starting timer; a rider who falls off a horse completely, before the starting line, regardless if the horse breaks the timer, a re-run will be offered at that moment in the same draw position or at the end of the class. If a barrel or timer is moved off its marker during competition, they must be reset prior to the next competitor's run to the proper markers. All contestants who competed on the incorrect pattern must re-run at the end of the class, or a no-time will be given.
17. Contestants may ride any horse, regardless of ownership, and may ride as many horses as they choose in a class. However, the Massey Agricultural Society has the discretion to disqualify for the horse's well-being. A horse may be ridden only one per class with the exception of lead line classes where a horse may be used for multiple riders.
 18. The draw shall be done in a random manner (computer, shuffling cards, drawing number chips, etc.) Riders with multiple entries must ride their draw in the position in which they draw up. Once set, the draw may not be changed, except to accommodate entries with the same horse or rider. The draw may not be changed to give preference to any rider or to accommodate another commitment of a particular rider such as work or another barrel race. All changes must be moved to the end of the draw.
 19. Rerun shall be granted if the timer fails to work properly, if the barrels/poles are not properly placed on their markers, or if the rider has completely fallen off before crossing the starting timer line.
 20. **Photographs**- The Massey Agricultural Society has the right to control the commercial use of photographs or other images from The Massey Agricultural Society events. A competitor will fill out a photo release form which provides consent for their images to be used for The Massey Agriculture Society promotional purposes across digital or print platforms. All commercial photographers must register as a vendor with the Massey Agricultural Society.
 21. Gate admission is required.
 22. Ribbons may be awarded to third place.
 23. Prize money will be sent to entrants by e-transfer on the Monday following an event.

HEAVY HORSE SHOW

1. Contestants will draw numbers to determine the order of pulling prior to competition.
2. Horses MUST stay within the pulling lines or will be disqualified
3. Any forward movement of the boat over 3 inches will constitute one attempt.
4. No team or single horse is to be left unattended at any time.
5. If a break in harness occurs there will be a time limit of 5 minutes only to fix the break. At that time the next team will be brought in.
6. Light teams start at 2,600 lbs. and increase in 600 lb. increments after the third hitch (4,400 lbs.) the heavy horses will start. The heavy teams do have the option of starting with the lights. Singles start at 1,400 lbs. and increase in 300 lb. increments.
7. There will be no substituting of horses during the pull. The teamsters can be substituted due to health reasons or danger to the public.
8. Teamsters have the option to keep the distance gained on the pull where the break in harness or equipment occurred.
9. Teamsters may have two helpers for a team or one helper for a single maximum.
10. Teamsters and helpers must stay behind the double trees.
11. Helpers are to have absolutely no vocal or physical contact with the horses while they are being hitched to the boat or making the pull.
12. If any horse or team becomes unmanageable, difficult to handle, or in any way becomes a danger to the public, the horse or team will be disqualified, and will be asked to leave the pull area immediately.
13. Helpers are not to lead the team or horse to the boat or at any time stand at their heads while they are being hitched.
14. Any teamster who climbs on the boat while a team or horse is hitched to the boat must stay on for the duration of the attempt.
15. In the case of a tie, the boat will be pulled back to the starting line and each team will have one try pulling the tying weight. The horse or team with the furthest distance takes the higher placing.
16. If a team enters the pulling area for the first pull, and they are wearing blinders, they must stay on. If the team is wearing open bridals, they must remain open for the complete attempt.
17. Slashing the lines, whipping, or using profane language while in the show area is PROHIBITED. These acts WILL constitute as faults and WILL disqualify the team from the contest. The judge will decide what constitutes as slashing or whipping.
18. All horses may be subject to drug testing. Absolutely NO drugs allowed.
19. The judge may disqualify horses or teamsters at any time either for violation of one or more of the rules, or because the contesting teams condition is such to render it cruel or inhumane to permit the horses to proceed.
20. The Judge may elect to start spotting the stone boat at the beginning of a round of pull at the same place for each team due to track condition.
21. Gate admission is required.
22. Ribbons may be awarded to third place.
23. Prize money will be sent to entrants by e-transfer on the Monday following an event.

Complaints will only be accepted in writing and must be delivered to the Massey Agricultural Society within 24 hours of the complaint with the required fee of \$50.00 stating the cause of the protest. Fee will be forfeited to the Society if said complaint is not sustained. JUDGE'S DECISION IS FINAL. Failure to comply with the direction of the Judge will result in immediate disqualification for the contestant.

Some events may overlap. Organizers cannot be held responsible for missed events.
